Sources of Strength

MSAD#11 is supporting the evidence based program Sources of Strength. Our data from MIYHS in 2023 reflects that in 2023 38 % of High School students felt sad or hopeless almost every day for two weeks or more and 39% of our Middle School students felt sad or hopeless almost every day for two weeks or more.

Sources of Strength is a best practice youth mental health promotion and suicide prevention program designed to harness the power of peer social networks to create healthy norms and culture, ultimately preventing suicide, violence, bullying, and substance misuse. We have 25 trained peer leaders at the High School and 18 at the Middle School. These peer leaders will be creating promotions that will be viewed throughout the school year. The High School has started their promotions with Positive Friends and Generosity campaigns.

We have also trained 5 adult mentors at the High School and 4 at the Middle School.

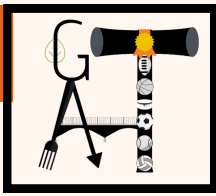
- Peer & Adult Mentor Trainings took place in November with NAMI

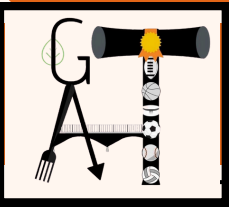
27 Doors Decorated!

SCHOOL BASED HEALTH CENTER ON TRACK TO BE APPROVED BY MSAD#11 SCHOOL BOARD

In the Spring of 2024 our School Nurse, Nora Diversi was able to make contact with Health Reach who had been running a School Based Health Center at Lawrence High School for the past 2 years. She made plans to visit the health center and in June we took a ride to Lawrence. 4 member of Gardiner Area Thrives Coalition Patricia Buck Welton, Kerry Mansir, Beth Brooker and Nora Diversi, with the Assistant Principal and Superintendent, toured the Health Center at Lawrence High School. Following the visit to the Health Center, we reached out to other possible coalition members, other healthcare providers and community members that would like to support a school based health center. The Advisory Committee was formed and there were two meetings over the summer that formed a plan to hold a community forum before going to the school board.

The Community Forum, planned for October 29th, was widely publicized through the MSAD#11 social media, newsletters and parent forums, Gardiner Area Thrives posted to their social media and shared with Gardiner Main Street to make sure the community was informed as well. The Forum took place on October 29th. 52 people attended including our legislative representatives, town councilors, teachers, administrators and parents. This forum was published in the local newspaper and channel 13 covered the forum.

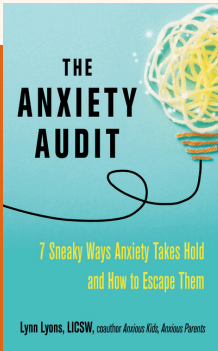
After the forum there was a request to have a proposal to have a School Based Health Center be presented to the MSAD#11 School Board. December 5th was secured as the date. The week before the School Board meeting there was a flurry of disinformation, myths put on social media and a push to have the school board reject the proposal. There was an automated email sent that bombarded the central office with over 500 emails opposing the School Based Health Center, 12 from the district. The others were from outside of our district and out of state. Superintendent Pat Hopkins shared that leading up to Thursday's meeting, she received 633 emails, 542 of which were in opposition to the school-based health center. Of the 542 emails, she said 521 had no connection to the school district, and a majority came from an automated email from a political campaign site. Just 12 of the emails in opposition to the health center came from people living inside the school district. The district has also experienced an influx of outside Freedom of Access Act requests from people outside of the school district, asking for information from far-of-right political groups and individuals, which Hopkins has since made public on the school website. Nora and Patricia worked diligently to engage community, staff and students to write letters of support and come to the meeting to testify.

The school board voted 8 to 2 to move forward with the process.

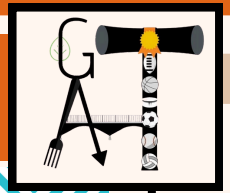
Lynn Lyons at Gardiner High School

The presentation was interactive and connected the students at the MS (45) and HS (55) with Sources of Strength.
